Accreditation

Unit Objective

This undergraduate unit (AQF Level 7) engages the thought and methods of the early Church Fathers, investigating the major trends in the Christian tradition to the early fifth century. It assists students to understand the connection between historical circumstances, the spiritual life and the formulation of Christian theology.

Learning Outcomes

1. Appreciate the historical and ecclesial contexts of various trends in early patristic tradition
2. Display an awareness of the main themes pertaining to early patristic tradition
3. Utilise primary and secondary sources in the analysis of patristic themes
4. Analyse themes pertaining to the early patristic tradition within their immediate and distant literary and historical contexts
5. Assess the relevance of patristic tradition to contemporary scholarship and the Christian experience

Enrolment Options

Students may enrol to attend all on-campus lectures (as per Schedule) or to study online. In either case, all students are required to attend the series of intensive lectures by Fr John Behr, on campus, 16-19 August 2018. The periodic Tuesday evening lectures by Fr Silouan Fotineas will be delivered on campus. They will be recorded and made accessible within Moodle to students studying online.
